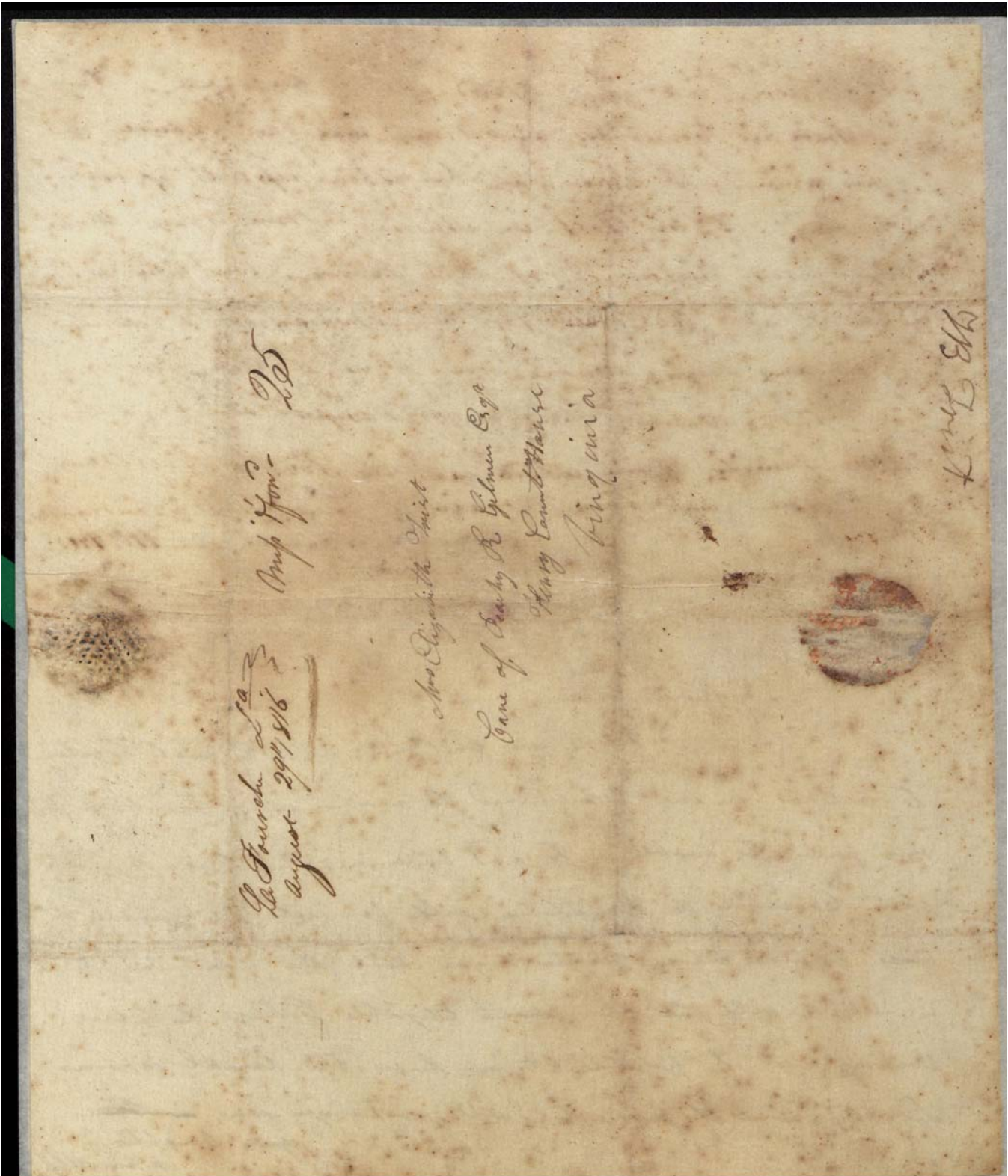


however in the hand of the Emperor, nor
